From the Principal External Examinations

The School Certificate examinations were held last week in the MPC. Students completed examinations in English, mathematics, science, history / geography

/civics and computing studies. This is the first major external examination these students have completed, and it is a daunting task – yearly school exams give an idea of what it will be like, but only the reality lets students understand the task they must get through. The results of these exams will be given to students on their Graduation Day, Monday December 14th. All students have been informed of the requirements for them to attend this graduation – if you are unsure, please check the website.

The HSC exams are still continuing. Most students have completed all their exams, but there are a few who have to wait until the last days of the exam period. Teachers are still available to assist these students, and we wish them all the best of luck as they come to the end of this very stressful period.

Year 9 Meeting

Thanks to all the parents and students who came to the Laptops meeting last Wednesday. This was the first major meeting we have held in the new library, and the space worked well, seating around 120 people who attended.

Remember to get the charters returned – no laptops can be issued to students until this has been completed.

And a reminder to parents: the laptops are an educational tool have strong security features; they are only able to access the DET Portal. They cannot be used for any social networking sites such as Facebook. Using one of these laptops is the same as using a computer at school – the safeguards are in place.

Students to attend Mathematics / Science Summer School

Congratulations to the following students who have been invited to attend Year 9 Girls + Maths + Science = Choices Summer School organised by the University of Newcastle. The six day program will give these girls a great introduction to careers in the areas of science and mathematics. End of Year Preparations

We are now more than halfway through term 4 – this is a short term, only 9 weeks long, and it is packed with things that need to be done before the year ends. Year 11 reports have been completed and handed out. Year 7 to 10 reports will be completed over the next few weeks. Year 7 Orientation Day will be held on Thursday December 3rd. Both year 9 and year 10 will be going on separate excursions to Melbourne; year 9 in the week starting Nov 30th, and year 10 Dec 7th.

Presentation Day will be held at school, in the MPC, on Wednesday December 16th, the last day of school for students. The last two days of that week are staff development days.

The builders believe that they will have completed all work by the end of this term. That still leaves us with some building work for next year: the new commercial kitchen, an upgrade of the other kitchen, improved facilities for Construction, painting of many classrooms that have not been refurbished and significant landscaping work in the playground. The school will remain very busy, even in the school holidays. Somehow, I can't find any reason to complain, even though it means the dislocation will continue for longer than originally planned.

WORK EXPERIENCE AT THE ZOO

Students in Year 10 next year have the opportunity to undertake Work Experience at either Taronga or Western Plains Zoo. As these positions are highly prized by students throughout NSW, the Zoos require applications by December this year so that they can plan their year. Each school can only send one student to each Zoo. If your daughter or son is interested in working with animals and you can arrange accommodation in Sydney or Dubbo, this would be an excellent Work Experience opportunity.

Tax File Numbers

The Tax Office, with the co-operation of schools, offers secondary students the opportunity to participate in a program which educates students about important tax issues, such as tax file numbers (TFN), relevant to living in Australian society.



Secondary students may need a TFN to apply for youth allowance or for part-time and holiday employment. To make it easier for students to get a TFN, students can choose to fill out a TFN application through their school.

The application form requires information such as the student's name, address, birth certificate registration number and date of birth. The class teacher and the school administration then certify the application. This means that the student does not need to attend the Tax Office with original proof of identity documents, or send those documents to the Tax Office.

This is a voluntary program and is being offered as a service to make it easier for students to obtain a TFN. An information flyer will be available for students.

If you would like to apply for a TFN see Mr Wright. This program is run in term 4 each year.

Space and Astronomy Show

2009 – The International Year of Astronomy, a United Nations initiative celebrating the 400th anniversary of Galileo turning his telescope to the sky and revolutionizing the way we think about the Universe and our place in it.

Welcome to 'Astronomy Outreach', bringing the entire Universe right into the classroom ...in a unique and exciting way! This program will give the students a refreshing new look at the latest discoveries in astronomy and space in a one hour audio visual display show by a top astronomer educator.

The programs audio-visual section, 'Discover the Universe', aligns with the current school curriculum and consists of several powerful, graphic intensive, PowerPoint slide shows with well placed sound effects, detailing the evolution of the Universe and the history of the Space Program. Throughout each talk, David Reneke will be using the latest, most up to date visual material available from NASA and the Hubble Telescope.

This activity is being made available to Yr 7 and Yr 9 on Monday 23^{rd} Nov. The cost is \$4.00 per student.

Norta Norta Aboriginal Education Program

Students from Dungog High School and Dungog Public School met on Wednesday 11 November to celebrate their aboriginal heritage through an art project. The painting of two large panels combining traditional and contemporary ideas in subject matter and materials directly relates to their sense of place in the Dungog area.

Shane Kennedy, an artist from Newcastle, was invited to assist students participating in the Norta Norta Aboriginal Education Program by tutors Rachel Stokes and Anne Fisher. Shane has wide experience working with young people in schools and community venues in the Hunter Valley.

Dungog High School students Haley Reeves, Lucinda Shilcock, Nathan Shakespeare, Kiara Whalen, Bradley Norris and Daniel Sherman worked alongside Patrick Cowin, Troy Cowin and Sam Russell from Dungog Public School.

The composition of the panel to be displayed at the High school is titled 'The nature of rivers'. Earthy and bright colours mingle, representing rivers, land and the flow of life. Water lines flow into the sun and link eight circular shapes for each of the Norta Norta students involved. They show unity and connection between people. The students spray painted their own symbols through stencils into the circles to show their individual interests of cars, soccer, sharks, turtles, BMX bikes and surf board riding.

Bush tucker is the theme of the panel for the Public School and is titled 'Yamily' combining the yam root and the concept of family unity. There are bush tucker images of a honey ant, witchetty grub, barramundi, emu, tortoise, possum, goanna and cockatoo. Lines and dots of greens and golds represent movement, the vibrations of the earth and air.

All the young people worked together very well, the older students mentoring the younger ones in a friendly and helpful way - even providing a guided tour around the high school, including an exciting visit to our new library.

Although it was our hottest November day so far, everyone agreed that it had been an excellent experience

YEAR 12 PARTIAL ATTENDANCE PROCEDURES.

These procedures are based on:

- Schools OH&S requirement to know "who is on campus at any given time?"
- School and staff "duty of care" requirements
- Historical precedent
- Manageability and required documentation
- Understanding that Year 12 students will use the added flexibility to constructively enhance their education.

These procedures are regularly reviewed and may be changed throughout the year to better meet the needs of our students, school or community. Please note that a positive public perception of Dungog High School benefits all our students. The privilege to have partial leave may be revoked on an individual basis if a student misuses it. Failure to comply with the procedures will result in disciplinary action.

THE FOLLOWING TYPES OF PARTIAL LEAVE ARE AVAILABLE FOR YEAR 12 STUDENTS.

- SPECIAL ACTIVITY: (This includes medical appointments, RTA appointments, family access to local businesses for out of town families. Does not include going to the shops for lunch, visiting friends etc.) This leave is for recess, lunch times or periods with no classes as confirmed with student timetable.
 - Student takes signed note from a parent outlining a valid reason for the leave to the office, before school on the day of the leave.
 - The office staff refers the student to the Deputy Principal if they are not sure it fits guidelines. On urgent occasions the Deputy Principal will phone parents to obtain verbal permission.
 - Student receives a leave pass. It is recorded in the "Pass Book" not the "Sign-out book"
- 2. IN TOWN STUDENTS GOING HOME FOR LUNCH OR RECESS.
 - Student supplies the office with signed note from a parent.
 - Receives and carries a "Lunch Pass" with them.
- 3. INTOWN STUDENTS WHO DO NOT HAVE A TIMETABLED CLASS ON
 - May sign-out/ sign-in in the "Sign-out Book" if:
 - Student has given a signed long-term note from parents to
 - Student has given a current copy of their timetable to the office.
- 4. OUT OF TOWN STUDENTS WITH THEIR OWN TRANSPORT. (May arrive late or go early but will not be granted leave to go out and return in the same day.)
 - Student must not have classes on.
 - Student has supplied the school office with a current copy of their timetable.
 - Student has given a signed long-term note from parents to the office.
 - Student has completed "Use of Private Motor Vehicles by students" form and given it to the Deputy Principal. If they are travelling with another student, the Deputy Principal must have a signed statement from their parents authorising them to travel with the student.
 - Student uses the "Sign-Out Book" to indicate their presence on campus.
- 5. STUDENTS REQUIRING THINGS FROM CARS PARKED JUST OUTSIDE THE SCHOOL GROUNDS

- Individual students may briefly visit cars if they have a note from a teacher.
- 6. PATHWAYS STUDENTS OR STUDENTS WITH VERY FEW LESSONS DURING A DAY. Occasionally students may only have one or two lessons in a day. Sometimes long-term special arrangements can be made for them not to attend on that day if the student:
 - Negotiates arrangements with the teacher of the periods they do have on and then supplies the office staff with a note from the teacher.
 - Has supplied the school office with a current copy of their timetable.
 - Has supplied the office with a long-term signed note from parents.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION:

THURSDAY AFTERNOON SPORT. Thursday afternoon sport is not a rostered part of the Year 12 school week. Year 12 students may leave the school grounds at the completion of period 5. If they wish to leave prior to period 5 they must follow one of the above procedures for partial attendance.

It is essential however that the school knows which students remain on the school campus on Thursday afternoon. To help with this two lists are kept in the school office. "Always leave school grounds on Thursday afternoon" and "Always remain at school on Thursday afternoon". All Year 12 students must place their names on one of these lists. The school office staff must be notified if there is to be any variation to these arrangements.

Definitions:

- School grounds/ School campus Area that is fenced/gated around main school buildings. Does not include Eloiza Street or Dowling's corner shop.
- Long-term note. A note outlining an extended time frame, eg. Term four, all 2010.

Who can sign notes?

- Students of any age who live in the family home with one or more parents require a parent/guardian signature.
- Students 18 years of age or over who live independently from their parents may sign their own note if the school has been officially notified of their situation.
- Students under 18 years of age who live independently from their parents will require the signature of a guardian the school has been officially notified about.

SENIOR STUDENTS' USE OF PRIVATE TRANSPORT.

- Students who drive cars to school must complete a "Use of Private Motor Vehicles by Students" form and give it to the Deputy Principal.
- Students who travel in cars with other students must supply the Deputy Principal with a signed statement from their parents/guardian authorising them to travel with the student.
