#### From the Principal Year 9 and 10 Excursions to Melbourne

All students at DHS have the opportunity to take part in 3 major excursions during their time at the school. The current arrangement is that these excursions occur in

years 7, 9 and 11. The year 7 excursion is a welcome to high school and allows students to get to know each other; it usually takes place in a location in the Hunter area. The year 9 excursion has changed in recent years and is now an interstate excursion to Melbourne. The year 11 excursion is well established as part of the mandatory Crossroads program; students choose to do this course either at school or at Jindabyne. Year 10 are taking part in the Melbourne excursion this year because they did not go on a major excursion last year.

The Melbourne excursion allows many students to experience a plane flight for the first time. They will see many of Melbourne's historic places and have the chance to experience Australia's second largest city – and a transport system that works well. Highlights will be the MCG, Old Melbourne Goal, the Powerhouse Museum, Chinatown, the Victorian Museum and the Victoria Markets. I know that all students will have a wonderful time and learn a lot about Australian history and culture.

## Korean Exchange Visit 2010

A reminder to all those interested in our exchange program with South Korea. We weren't able to hold the exchange in 2009 because of swine flu. 2010 is looking like a better opportunity for us to continue this program. I met Mr Kim, the organizer of our exchange, last week and he is keen to see us involved again.

## **Buildings Progress**

The two new buildings are well in use and we can see progress in the areas being refurbished. The old library has a new roof and has been completely changed internally. It will become a staff area, with two staff studies and a common room. The music and art rooms are moving ahead – these rooms will be repainted and refitted for their new use. The art room takes up two former classrooms; the performance room also takes over two classrooms. The steel frames are up and the walls are nearly there in the new Industrial Arts room. The builders expect to be finished all this work by the end of this term.

The Trade Training Centre buildings will not start until the middle of 2010. There is a lot of detailed planning to happen before this project is ready to start, so we will have a short breather before we again go into demolition and building mode.

Dear Parent,

Are you concerned about your child drinking alcohol? You have every right to be. Australian research shows that 96 percent of kids under the age of 17 have tried alcohol, with 21 percent drinking alcohol every week.

### Why should you be concerned?

New research shows young people's brains can be seriously damaged from drinking alcohol. There is now evidence to suggest that binge drinking destroys the growing brain's ability to relay information between cells.

One third of 12-17yr old drinkers are consuming at harmful levels. It indicates kids have easy access to alcohol and are drinking too much.

#### What can you do?

As a parent, you are the most important role model for your child. Your attitude to alcohol and personal behaviour will have a big influence on your child and the decisions they make:

- *Talk to your child and be involved in their life* if you know what is going on and can talk openly, you are more likely to be able to influence your child's attitude towards drinking.
- *Know where your teenager is* check where the parties are going to be, whether they are supervised and if alcohol is being served.
- Talk to other parents presenting a united front makes it easier for everyone.
- Use alcohol responsibly yourself and be a responsible host. Show your children that you can also have fun without alcohol too.
- Encourage your child not to drink until they are at least 16 years old.
- Point out the risks don't be afraid to disapprove of unsafe drinking behaviour.

#### What are we doing?

In most Australian states and territories, it is still *legal* for anybody to provide your child with any amount of alcohol on private property, without your permission. Without the right laws in place, there is nothing to protect young people against drinking a damaging amount and drinking without parental consent.

In Queensland New South Wales and Tasmania, it is illegal to supply alcohol to kids under the age of 18 without a parent's permission. We believe the protection of young people in those cases should be extended to all young Australians regardless of where they live.
