# Welcome back year 9

# School Maintenance - bus bays

A number of years ago I requested that the DEC Assets Management Unit look at our bus bays and upgrade them to a better level. The bus bays are used twice every day by the majority of our students; they are, at best, very basic.

I have just received information that there will be some significant improvements made over the next few months. The drainage will be improved, taking away overflows that affect the pavement. There will also be improvements to the surface where students stand, making it more even and less likely to cause trips.

It won't be as good as starting from scratch, but it will increase the safety of the area for students and staff. Hopefully, much of the work will be completed in the school holidays.

#### YEAR 10 WORK EXPERIENCE

The end of the year is a good time for Year 10 to revisit their Work Experience employer or try out another workplace. The same process applies for Work Experience as it did earlier in the year. Students need to request a placement with an employer (it can be for as long as the employer is willing to have the student) and then see me to get the necessary paperwork to ensure they are covered by insurance.

For students who are hoping to secure full time employment in the near future, evidence of investigating work and having some knowledge of the industry will certainly help in applying for jobs. A positive Employer Report is also invaluable.
