Principal. P&C meeting

We usually have only one P&C meeting in term 4 each year, so it was good to see a core of parents and friends of the school at last week's meeting. There were three presentations that P&C members said they appreciated and enjoyed.

The first two presentations were to show the P&C how the funds donated for particular programs had been used. Ms Archer and Mrs Neilson spoke about the Business Studies Enterprise Day, which is now in its second year. The P&C had donated \$1000 to get this program up and running. It has proven to be a great success with the year 11 Business Studies students and the rest of the school. The students worked in groups of 4 to come up with a business idea, create the product, research the market, gain sponsorship and then sell the product to the rest of the school on the Business Enterprise Day. Any profits made on the day were donated to a charity of the students' choice.

The second presentation was by Ms McLarty. She outlined the Peer Tutor Reading Scheme; the P&C has provided \$2000 to cover the cost of the TAFE course that the reading tutors complete to gain qualifications to work in this program. Not only do

these students gain the recognised TAFE qualification, they give freely of their time to help younger students to improve their literacy and numeracy. This has been a very successful program over a number of years and has achieved some outstanding successes for our students.

Ms McLarty also thanked the P&C for funding the Student of the Week program - one student is selected by the executive and staff each week for showing by their actions that they understand

the school's values of Respect, Responsibility and Personal Best. Each of these students is noted in the weekly newsletter and gains a \$25 voucher. By recognising and rewarding these students, the P&C is helping them gain confidence and showing other students the type of actions that we value.

The third presentation was about where we are up to with our Strategic Plan. This Plan will govern the school's operation for the next three years. Many people have contributed to its development, and the P&C will be consulted further as it is nearing completion.

Health Information

Aerosol Deodorant/body spray

Out of concern for the health of a number of our students, **no aerosol deodorant or body spray is to be used at school** (this includes inside and outside of buildings, in the bus bays, on the bus, in the playground etc.) We have many students who are affected by the deodorants/body sprays, some to the extent that their airways will close up and may result in a medical emergency. Please use alternative deodorant (eg. Roll on) if needed and students are strongly encouraged to bring their sports shirts/clothes for PE lessons/sport, that they can change into/out of.

Sun Safety

Students are strongly encouraged to wear hats and use sunscreen when they are out in the sun. Over the past few years we have had a number of campaigns to reinforce the Slip, Slop, Slap, Slide and Seek message, including tickets for sunsafe students to win prizes, poster competitions (the winning posters are up around the school reminding students to be sunsafe), house competitions etc. Sunscreen is provided and encouraged to be used for all outside PE lessons and is available for sport and at break times. It is a concern, the number of students who choose not to bring and wear a hat (many who say they do not own a hat) and who do not choose to apply sunscreen. We have applied for a grant for extra shade at school (through the Cancer Council), although this year were unsuccessful (over 300 schools applied) and we are looking at alternative funding to assist in creating more shady areas in the school, combined with other strategies to create a more sunsafe environment. We are continually looking at ways to encourage students to take responsibility for their own health and be sunsafe.

- Health Care Plans

Health care plans have started to be sent out for updating or confirmation that details have not changed. They will continue to be sent out over the next few weeks. We ask that you please check these and send them back in with any necessary changes, or signed to confirm they are correct. Thank you to the families who have already sent them back in. If your child has a health issue that we are not aware of, please contact the school so that we can send the required paperwork home and work toward creating a health care plan for them. It is important for us to have the appropriate information for the best care for your child.

HSIE Site Study Excursion

Year 7, 8 and 10 History students have been busy over the last couple of weeks attending their compulsory Site Study excursions. The HSIE site study excursions are a compulsory part of the History and Geography syllabus for all students in Years 7 to 10. Students who do not attend these excursions are required to complete an independent site study research project during their own time.

Year 7 and 8 students spent the day in Sydney attending two wonderful programs run at The Big Dig. The first program is called Cesspits and Old Rubbish and teaches the students how archaeologists work to uncover evidence about society. The second program revolved around Aboriginal Dreaming in and around The Rocks.

Year 10 students also spent the day in Sydney. They had two excursions on the day. The first was to Sydney Aquarium where they were able to explore the different areas and examine all the different types of water life on display. The second excursion was a little more emotional for the students as we visited the Sydney Jewish Holocaust Museum. The students listened to Olga, who is a survivor of the Holocaust, who told the story of her life and experiences during World War II. The students then had a guided tour of the Museum.



The students had a great time and were excellent representatives for the school.

Guest Speaker – Lorin Nicholson

On Monday 10th November, the school was lucky enough to have Lorin Nicholson visit the school and speak to both staff and students. Lorin was born with a condition which has meant that he is legally blind and has been for his entire life. As a child his sight was about 10% that of a person with perfect vision. As a



child Lorin learned to play the guitar despite his vision and has overcome a great deal of adversity in his life.

While at the school Lorin spoke to the SRC about his life, played a few songs and spoke about leadership and what it means to be a leader. The students found this to be very useful and enjoyed their time with Lorin immensely.

Lorin then spent some time with one of our students who suffers a visual impairment, before addressing the entire school. Lorin spoke about his life and the wonderful things he has achieved, such as riding his bicycle across Australia, as well as some of the less pleasant parts of his life, like being bullied at school.

Some students were even given the opportunity to experience what it is like to have a vision impairment with the aid of a pair of glasses that were painted with small holes that were blurred. I tried on these glasses and could not even make out the shape of my own hand right in front of my face.

Once again, Lorin played a few songs for the students which was a pleasant way to spend the afternoon.
