Principal. **Final Week of HSC**

The HSC examinations for this week are Geography and Visual Arts. Art is the final HSC examination for the year, so we expect to hear sighs of relief all around us as the week goes on.

Students who have completed all their examinations can get a sign-out form that they then take to all their teachers. It is very important that they remember to bring back all the textbooks they have used this year - the current year students 11/12 are waiting for these books for their own study.

HSC Appeals

All HSC Appeals for consideration under Sickness or Misadventure must be forwarded by the school to BOSTES by Monday next week. I have had a number of students collect the forms over the past few weeks; I have explained to them what they need to do to complete them. I am required to write a statement on each of these applications and sign them before they can be sent to BOSTES, so it is very important that students return the forms to me in time to have the supporting statement written. I will be out of the school on Friday this week and have asked students to ensure their application comes in by Wednesday.

I am also preparing an appeal for all of our HSC students to cover the period of dislocation caused by the floods in April. I am very aware that for some students this has been a very lengthy period - not just the weeks around the time of the floods. Students who have experienced ongoing problems will be writing individual appeals, which will be strongly supported. The general appeal is because all of our students were affected to some degree in their focus and concentration, continuity of study and level of emotional distress by the floods and the two tragedies that occurred at the same period.

I would like to thank Dungog Shire Mayor, Mr Harold Johnston, for providing a supporting statement for all our students concerning the effect of the floods on the community. I would also like to thank Janelle O'Neil and the Dungog Chronicle staff for providing copies of the articles and photographs from that period, strong supporting evidence for all of the appeals.

Year 10 examinations and the rules about leaving school

Year 10 will also be sitting their end of year examinations this week. In past years - and this is getting further into the distance with each year that passes - year 10 was considered an ending point of schooling with many students leaving soon after their examinations.

The changes to the School Leaving Age and the new School Attendance rules mean that the expectation for year 10 students is that they are at school for the remainder of the school year. Any absences that are not within DE guidelines must be recorded by the school as unjustified. If no information is received by the school within 7 days to explain the absence and note that it is within the guidelines, the "unjustified" has to remain on the student's record of attendance.

Peer Support Camp

Congratulations to all the year 9 and 10 students who will be taking part in the Peer Support camp later this week. These students have been selected to become student mentors for the incoming year 7 students in 2016.

Sentral's parent portal provides parents with 24/7 access to important information about their child/children.

To use the Parent portal, you will need to register as a parent user. Each parent has been sent a letter from the school by Mr Curran, our Sentral Coordinator, explaining this simple process and providing you with a unique access code. You cannot register without this code. If you did not receive a letter, or if you lose your registration access code, you can contact the school for a new one.

You will be able to register for the Parent Portal at any time after receiving the letter.

Student Letterbox

To save students lining up and waiting to hand in notes or pay for excursions, fees, etc we have started a new system with a 'Student Letterbox'. Students can drop the following in the Letterbox:

- · permission notes,
- · absence notes,
- · correct monies with permission note in a sealed envelope, and
- early leaver requests (note all Thursday early leaver requests must FIRST be signed by the Deputy).

If a student does need change and/or a receipt to take home they will need to stay in line, or come back later to collect it.

Pillow Talk Thursday, 5 November, 9.45am for 10.30 am and 7 pm The Martian (M) Saturday, 7 November, 4pm and 7 pm The Nightingale (G) Sunday, 15 November, 7 pm Bridge of Spies (M) Saturday, 21 November, 7 pm The Dressmaker (M) Saturday, 28 November, 4 pm and 7 pm Macbeth (MA15+) Sunday, 13 December, 7 pm

In their first romantic comedy together, Doris Day and Rock Hudson star in **Pillow Talk** as an uptight interior decorator and an amorous playboy who are forced to share a party line. Directed by Michael Gordon, and also starring Tony Randall and Thelma Ritter, Pillow Talk remains today what it was when released in 1959 - a timeless gem of romantic comedy. There are day and night screenings of this Hollywood classic. As a special treat, both the morning and evening sessions will be introduced by the President of the Australian Doris Day Society, Mr Alan Moore, who will talk about the film, and the career and life of Miss Doris Day. This coming Thursday 5th, at 9.45am for a 10.30am start, and 7pm.

Smart, thrilling, and funny, The Martian offers a faithful adaptation of the bestselling novel by Andy Weir about an astronaut stranded on the Red Planet. This high octane space adventure brings out the best in leading man Matt Damon and sci-fi master director Ridley Scott. Everyone is talking about this film, see it on Saturday 7 November, at 4pm and 7pm.

The Nightingale is the beautiful story of an old Chinese farmer living alone in Beijing, who sets out on a long journey with his spoiled granddaughter to honour the promise he made his late wife to take back the bird that is now his only companion in the city. A sweet film about bridging the generation gap, by French director Philippe Muyl, The Nightingale was China's official entry in the 2014 Oscars. Part of the Dungog Film Society 2015 program, it screens at 7pm on Sunday November 15.

In Bridge of Spies, Tom Hanks stars as the American lawyer recruited by the CIA on a near-impossible mission to negotiate the release of a captured U-2 pilot shot down over Russia at the height of the Cold War. This much anticipated historical drama from DreamWorks Studios

marks the return of Steven Spielberg to the director's chair. One screening only, on Saturday November 21 at 7pm.

The Dressmaker is the story of glamorous femme fatale Tilly (Kate Winslet) who returns to her home town in the bush after many years in Europe to right the wrongs of the past. With her sewing machine and high style, she transforms the women of her small town and exacts sweet revenge on those who did her wrong. Directed by Jocelyn Moorhouse (Proof, How to make an American Quilt) it has a stellar Australian cast including Liam Hemsworth, Hugo Weaving, Judy Davis and Sarah Snook. See it at both 4pm and 7pm on Saturday 28 November.

And in December we'll have a special screening of the modern masterpiece Macbeth, from the director of Snowtown, Australian director Justin Kurzel. This critically acclaimed adaptation of William Shakespeare's play stars Michael Fassbender and Marion Cotillard. This is a special bonus for Dungog Film Society subscribers - it's been a good year, so this film is only \$10, if you've hung on to your subscription pass. (Others welcome to see this classic at the normal price of \$12). It screens at 7pm on Sunday 13 December.
